Specific Challenges

- Parishes unable to afford full-time clerics and diminishing financial resources
- Clergy deployment in struggling parishes, often insufficient number of clergy or lack of those with the necessary gifts for rebuilding
- Continuing sexuality issues drain much available time and energy from the ministry and mission of the diocese especially in a relatively theologically conservative context

Answers to questions requested:

1) How could the Province impact the diocese?

It is often difficult to identify ways in which the Province influences, impacts or assists the diocese.

- i. ACPO is a useful service the diocese in the discernment process for potential ordination candidates. Need to stay in step with local ministry realities and the changing demographic of candidates eg different emphasis needed for second vocation/mature candidates vs younger new vocations younger candidates sometimes hear they need more life experience.
- ii. Provincial Sexual Harassment Policy useful as model for our diocesan policy.
- iii. Provincial Prayer Care useful but not readily accessible in the past.
- iv. Provincial web site is a static resource

The Provincial level of structure may seem to be one of little real importance or impact?

- 2) What does the diocese have to contribute to the Province?
 - i. The Diocese of Fredericton would be happy to have dioceses within the Province (or the National Church) benefit from work done and resources utilized recently to implement DIMS for contact and statistical data management. A shared and consistent approach to statistic gathering and analysis across the wider church would be of benefit to all.
 - ii. Strengthening of our efforts in the area of ministry to children and youth may offer an additional model of approach for ministry in the Eastern Canadian context.
